Who is it you are looking for? John 20.15



As I was looking ahead at the Gospel for Easter and the 2nd Sunday of Easter something struck me as funny—not funny as in "ha ha", but funny as in odd. The Gospel for Easter is John 20.1-9...Mary of Magdala goes to the tomb of Jesus, finds it empty and runs to tell Peter and another disciple who also investigate the site and find Jesus gone. On the 2nd Sunday of Easter, we again hear from John 20.19-31...Jesus appears to the disciples and we hear the once unbelieving Thomas declare about Jesus *My Lord and my God*. What struck me as

strange is that we *don't* hear what I shall call the "missing verses" from John 20. We hear the entirety of John 20 *with the exception of verses 10-18!* So, here's what's missing:

Then the disciples returned home.

But Mary stayed outside the tomb weeping. And as she wept, she bent over into the tomb and saw two angels in white sitting there, one at the head and one at the feet where the body of Jesus had been. And they said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken my Lord, and I don't know where they laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus there, but did not know it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Who is it you are looking for?" She thought it was the gardener and said to him, "Sir, if you carried him away, tell me where you laid him, and I will take him." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni,"* which means Teacher. Jesus said to her, "Stop holding on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and tell them, 'I am going to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary of Magdala went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord," and what he told her.

Those "missing verses" are not heard during any Sunday of the Easter season! (If you attend liturgy on Tuesday of the Octave of Easter [Easter Tuesday] you will hear them proclaimed.) I think the one sentence I've highlighted, **Who is it you are looking for?** is important for each of us to consider! In John's Gospel the very first thing Jesus says after his resurrection echoes the first thing he says at the beginning of the Gospel. The question begs an answer.

In your life are you looking for Jesus? Are you able to see him in the faces of the people who sit next to you in church? Can you see him in the eyes of the homeless woman begging for money on the corner? Is he making an appearance in the kid sitting next to you in class? Can you look past the outer appearance and recognize Jesus in the single parent, the gay person, the divorced, the lonely, the disabled, those who cry out to be noticed?

The fact of the matter is this: Jesus continues to be present to us every day...are we looking for him?

Dignity Detroit is a ministry that promotes spiritual growth within the straight, gay, lesbian, bi-sexual and transgender community of Metropolitan Detroit. In addition to our weekly Liturgies, our organization conducts/funds several outreach programs every year.
