Frankly Speaking

I was fortunate to spend the last two weeks in June traveling throughout Italy. One of my stops was the ancient walled city of Assisi. Assisi is not a tourist destination but more a city for pilgrimages. The only motorized vehicles were

scooters and I was able to walk the very clean city streets without the crowds of tourists and sidewalk venders. It is one of the most beautiful and peaceful cities I have ever visited in my life. Saint Francis of Assisi has been my guardian angel ever since grade school (St. Barbara in Dearborn) when we had to pick our favorite saint.

While in Assisi, I purchased a novelized biography of St. Francis. Annual Canned Good / Non-Perishable Food Items Collection

We will once again conduct our annual canned good/non-perishable food item collection on the **four Sundays in October (beginning on Sunday, October 5th and concluding on Sunday, October 26th).** Council has chosen Freedom House in Detroit as the beneficiary of the items collected. We have been honored to have residents of Freedom House of Detroit attending our weekly Liturgies since September. We are especially honored to have these fine folks as official members of Dignity Detroit! The brief mission statement and history below is from the Freedom House/Detroit website. As always, your generosity and support is greatly appreciated.

Mission

Freedom House is a temporary home for survivors of persecution from around the world seeking legal shelter in the United States and Canada. Our mission is to uphold a fundamental American principle, one inscribed on the base of the Statue of Liberty, of providing safety for those "yearning to breathe free."

Guided by our belief that all people deserve to live free from oppression and to be treated with justice, compassion and dignity, our goals are to offer a continuum of care and services to persons living in our shelter, as well as to other refugees in need, and to advocate for systemic change that more fully recognizes the rights of refugees and asylum seekers.

In 2012, we became a partner in the Northern Tier Anti-Trafficking Consortium servicing victims of human trafficking.

History

In 1983, horrified by reports of political torture and murder in El Salvador, a group of Detroiters came together to help refugees who had fled that country and were arriving in the city in droves due to its proximity to Canada. Existing homeless shelters were unable to meet the particular legal, medical, language and resettlement needs posed by this refugee population. Residents of Windsor, Ontario, with the same concerns joined with the U.S. group to form the Detroit/Windsor Refugee Coalition, specifically for refugees and asylum seekers. The Canadians' assistance was especially valuable because, at the time, asylum in Canada was more readily available. Refugees who could not secure asylum in the United States were taken to the Canadian Customs and Immigration Station in Windsor, where someone from the coalition would offer them housing.

St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Corktown was the coalition's first site for its office and temporary housing for the refugees. The Rev. Glendon Heath, a priest of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan, was the coalition's first coordinator. The passionately dedicated Sr. Kit Concannon assisted Fr. Heath and became coordinator when he moved to a diocesan appointment.

The coalition's reputation spread rapidly throughout the U.S. and the number of refugees seeking assistance grew. The housing at St. Peter's Church quickly became inadequate, so the coalition moved to the unused Ste. Anne's convent in southwest Detroit, which remains our home today. During the incumbency of Janet Ray, a tireless, visionary and committed coordinator, our name was changed to Freedom House. In 2012, we became an official member of the Northern Tier Anti-Trafficking Consortium (NTAC) servicing victims of human trafficking.

Since our founding the refugees arriving at Freedom House have reflected the areas of conflict and turmoil in the world. From the El Salvadorans of the 1980s, we saw many refugees from the Middle East in the 1990s and Somalians after the crisis in that country in 1992. Today the vast majority of our residents come from sub-Saharan Africa, especially Democratic Republic of Congo, Rwanda, Uganda and Cameroon. We also see several refugees from Latin America and the Middle East. We continue to assist refugees who wish to enter Canada, but now nearly all of our clients seek asylum in the United States.

Compared with other parishes we have an extremely high number of folks who volunteer.

We need you to make that commitment again and fill out the Volunteer form that can be found on page 6 of this newsletter. Please take a moment to fill out the form and mark those ministries where you have an interest. Don't worry if you've never done a particular thing before WE WILL TRAIN YOU!

We especially need volunteers in the following areas:

- Sacristan...this person sets up all the liturgical vessels and books before liturgy
- Acolyte...this person assists the priest/presider at the altar and serves as a Eucharistic Minister
- Greeter...this person arrives early to liturgy to welcome people and hand out the hymnals
- Choir...I'm sure Kevin would welcome anyone who has a desire to lead us in song. No experience is necessary. The choir generally meets at 5pm each week to have a brief rehearsal.
- Liturgical Decoration...these people decorate the chapel for the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. Creativity allowed!!!

There are two "new" ministries I added to the form which deserve attention. We could really use additional volunteers who will serve as *after-mass sacristan* and *launderer*. The after-mass sacristan is responsible for purifying all the liturgical vessels after mass and returning everything to its place in the sacristy. Ross has been serving in this role for as long as I can remember and I'm sure he would appreciate some assistance. You will be trained in the proper way to complete this ministry. The launderer is responsible for washing/drying/ironing all the altar linens and altar cloths. Currently Sonja and Marylou are taking care of this, but we would certainly welcome others who wish to share in this important ministry. Again, you will be trained.

Please bring the completed form to the chapel the next time you celebrate liturgy with us and either give it to a member of Council or place it in the collection basket.


